PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Learning Spaces Project

Earlier this year I discussed with you our projects redesigning two of our learning spaces into flexible, future focussed learning spaces – these being the old metals workshop and the top level of the library. These projects are not well advanced in planning and costing. The next stage of this program has been released this term with faculties invited to submit an expression of interest for one of two \$10k grants to transform a learning space in their area. This opportunity has been received with much enthusiasm. What is exciting is not the idea of new furniture, but new ideas about how we use space and the ways we teach kids and engage them in the learning process.

Staff Sharing their Expertise

Two of our staff have been recognised for their expertise and have been asked to present at a broad level. Mark Macdonald is presenting to the History Teachers Association of NSW his expertise in the Ancient History HSC examination. Caroline McTeigue has been asked to speak at a state forum for Year 12 Society and Culture students. It is fantastic that we have teachers of such high capacity who are sharing their depth of knowledge across NSW.
