# From the Principal

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the learning community of Henry Kendall High School for the warm welcome I have received since taking up the role of Principal at the start of Term 4. In the short time I have been here I have been impressed by the calibre, maturity and talent of our students; the quality, experience and dedication of our staff; the family based culture of our school; and the support of our community in ensuring that we are providing the best education and opportunities for personal growth for our students. Henry Kendall is a strong school and I look forward to building on those strengths with you in the coming years.

I believe in a school that holds strong beliefs about the relationships we build with our parents and our community in order to best support and develop each student as an individual. At Henry Kendall High we provide a caring and dynamic learning environment where all students can achieve their potential. This can only occur when we have strong partnerships with parents and across our community.

We want our families strongly involved with our school. Communication between the school and parents/caregivers is essential in providing a strong working relationship that ensures the best opportunities for each student. I encourage parents to maintain contact with all levels of school staff, express concerns, seek awareness regarding school or Departmental policy, seek information about their child's progress, be involved in school activities, and have a 'voice' through the P&C Committee. We enjoy strong support from our parents and the local community, and we are proud of our role in Public Education where we serve the needs of our local community. The support, shared vision, mutual respect, and active participation of our community help us to provide a proactive school committed to ensuring opportunities and high standards.

I would like to take this opportunity to highlight the retirement of Jan Gillespie and to recognise the significant contribution that Jan made to Henry Kendall High School and to Public Education in NSW. Jan was a member of the Henry Kendall community for eight years in the roles of Head Teacher, Deputy Principal and, most particularly, in the role of Relieving Principal where her contribution in a short period of time was significant. As an educator, Jan set the highest standards for herself, her staff and her students, but it is her passion for this school that has made her such an integral part of the fabric of this community. I wish Jan well for her retirement and thank her for all that she contributed to Henry Kendall High School.

NSW Public Schools are entering into a new three year planning cycle where we consider our challenges, targets and priorities over 2012-2014, and plan strategies to address these. In order to make such decisions from a clear and informed basis we are undertaking a thorough school evaluation process to gather data and information to guide future school directions. In our evaluation we will be looking to harness both parent and student voices to gain a true picture of our school. Students will be involved in forums and survey opportunities that will be led by our student leaders. Parents will be given opportunities to share their thoughts with us through surveys, forums and random phone surveys. We value the thoughts and opinions of all in our learning community. If you are not engaged in this process but would like to have a say please then contact me before the end of the year.

I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate our student leadership body for 2012 – our School Captains, Vice Captains, Prefects, Student Representative Council and

House Captains. The variety of school leaders we have at Henry Kendall High work to support the school in many ways, from volunteering for community service, fundraising for charity, dealing with individual student issues, representing the school at special events, raising ideas with the teaching staff and executive, and generally promoting all the positive aspects of this great school. There are a number of strong qualities that are evident in our student leaders of 2012. They have the belief that they can make a difference. They participate in activities with willingness and enthusiasm. They consistently model positive behaviour and set an example wearing the correct uniform, treating people with respect, encouraging others to behave appropriately, doing their best and enjoying school, and they are proud of their school. These qualities will stand them in good stead to undertake their duties. I congratulate our 26 school leaders and have every faith in the positive impact they will have through 2012.

The recent holiday break brought significant steps in the Gosford Primary School relocation project. J Block has been vacated to allow redevelopment works to commence with Maths and Science rooms moved to relocatable classrooms. This was a significant undertaking, and the work and cooperation of Coastal Constructions, Pluim's Construction and Adrian's Transport should be recognised for their efforts and care. I would also like to commend the staff of Henry Kendall High for their cooperation and hard work in this process. Most particular thanks go to one of our Deputy Principal's, Bob Cox whose dedication and tireless efforts coordinated the entire process. As a result of all parties our most important focus was achieved - teaching and learning of our students proceeded without any significant disruption. The redevelopment works in the upper floor of J block commenced in early November with an estimated completion time around April 2012. Further information is available on the school's web site.

2012 will also see a major change in the school's day structure. We will be moving from eight 40 minute lessons in a day to five 60 minute lessons. This will provide students with greater blocks of learning time with fewer disruptions and reduced movement around the school. Sport will move from Thursday afternoons to Tuesday afternoons. For our senior students the predominant TAFE day will also move from Thursday to Tuesday. We will also be moving from a one week timetable to a two week cyclic timetable that has Week A and Week B. There will be a minor change in school day times to accommodate the buses with the school day beginning at 8.55am and finishing at 3.10pm. For the first six months the school will be trialling a change to its break times, moving to two 30 minute breaks each day. While we anticipate there may be a period of adjustment for students, the changes will quickly become part of the regular fabric of their day and week.

I would like to congratulate Year 10 students on the mature and focussed manner in which they approached the School Certificate examinations. The Board of Studies examiners who conducted these examinations commented on the outstanding behaviour and attitude of the Henry Kendall High students, for which Year 10 are to be commended. I certainly wish our students all the best with their results from these examinations. However, these examinations do not conclude Year 10 courses of study. Year 10 students need to remember that their School Certificate requirements and eligibility continues until the 16 December, and attendance until this date is required. During this time Year 10 will be provided with a program that prepares them for the transition into the senior school. A number of prerequisite requirements for the HSC will be completed during this program. These are mandatory, and attendance of all students is required.

Year 11 have now begun their Higher School Certificate courses. This is a vital time for Year 11 and it is imperative that they realise the importance of their studies from this point on – it is not Term 4 of Year 11, it is Term 1 of Year 12, and the work undertaken this term will contribute to and affect their HSC.

There are a number of very special functions the school conducts to conclude the year;

- Year 10 Formal Ceremony at the Japanese Gardens East Gosford, Monday 12 December from 5pm-7.30pm, followed by the School Social at the School Hall.
- School Certificate Presentation Ceremony for Year 10 students and parents, Wednesday 14 December 2011 in the School Hall.
- Annual Presentation Evening Tuesday 8 December 2011 in the School Hall from 6.30pm.

School concludes this year on Friday 16 December 2011 and arrangements for the start of 2012 are;

- Friday 27 January 2012 School Development Day (no pupils).
- Monday 30 January 2012 school resumes for Years 7, 11 & 12.
- Tuesday 31 January 2012 school resumes for Years 8, 9 & 10.

As Christmas rapidly approaches, I would like to congratulate the staff and students of Henry Kendall High for their hard work throughout a busy and productive year. Throughout 2011 Henry Kendall High School has achieved a wide range of success in academic, cultural and sporting endeavours, and these accomplishments have come from the creation of a 'culture of success', one in which this school's community is rightly proud. At Henry Kendall High School success has developed from the significant opportunities that are provided to students, the desire to strive for and achieve ones 'personal best', and the enthusiasm in which our students both participate and rise to a challenge. In 2011 this 'culture of success' is something that is in evidence on many levels. # **Deputy Principal (Administration)**

The school (mainly Maths and Science classes) is now operating in the new air-conditioned demountables due to the start of the refurbishment of J Block to accommodate Gosford Public School arriving from the beginning of 2014. The movement from J Block into these temporary rooms, as well as to other areas of the school, was a success due to the excellent work of staff and contractors late last term and over the holidays. Without their outstanding effort and patience, the process could have been a very real, ongoing problem. The school was operational from Period 1 of Day 1, Term 4 and has been a credit to all involved. Issues relating to the covering of the walkway to the demountables and bubbler access are currently being resolved.

#### Year 11 into Year 12

Year 11 are now our new Year 12 as of the beginning of this term. Students have had interviews with executive staff to discuss their progress and plans for the future. In many cases, students elected to drop one subject to concentrate on their remaining 5 subjects for their HSC. Although this is common, it is advisable for communication to be undertaken between students, parents and staff to ensure that the best HSC outcome is achieved. Congratulations to all staff involved for their time spent assisting our newest Year 12 students.

Year 12 now have the additional opportunity to have flexible attendance. This system has been outlined to all students at an assembly, and to parents via letter. Students may arrive at school by 10.00am if they do not have timetabled lessons for Periods 1 and 2, and may leave after their final lesson of the day. In both instances, students must sign in and out at the Front Office. No student may leave the premises between lessons. If at school and no lesson is timetabled, it is a *study* period and all students must be in the library or in the senior playground area.

The month of November is always an eventful one in schools. The HSC marks the end of thirteen years of schooling for many fine young people and the completion of the School Certificate signifies the end of Stage 5 and the beginning of the Stage 6 experience – senior school. Year 8, too, has recently sat the ESSA test online. This test examines the knowledge, skills and understanding of Science.

Henry Kendall Year 10 students were complimented on their conduct and attitude towards the exams by Mrs Jann Huey, Board of Studies Presiding Officer. Mrs Huey was especially pleased with how Year 10 entered the room and applied themselves during the examination. The School Certificate exam does not represent the completion of the Year 10 course. ALL faculties are completing aspects of their course work and using content to develop skills necessary for the completion of the HSC, including the mandatory Board of Studies requirement - HSC All My Own Work. Year 10 will also be completing taster days of the courses they are completing next year to help the transition of students into Year 11 as well as participate in study skill workshops for senior studies. Our Career and Transition team have also organised some courses such as a Barista course, OHS Whitecard and Work Ready programs in the coming weeks for your students. It is important we work together on your children's attendance as it is compulsory until the end of the school year, culminating in the School Certificate Presentation on 14 December. I look forward to seeing you there!

The Year 12 Formal is an important celebration to mark the end of school. Thirteen years of class learning out of eighteen years of life is a significant journey. While we'll miss all our students, it's such a pleasure to see such mature, well rounded individuals launch into the big wide world. We are looking forward to hearing of your success and adventures over the coming weeks and years as the HKHS family continues to grow, your stories are our stories too.

On 5 December we will be hosting Orientation Day for the 2012 Year 7 students. These students have already participated in many activities such as Taster Days, Sports Gala Days and visits from students and teachers to their school in preparation for the giant leap to Secondary School. Many of the students this year are siblings of current students from Point Clare and Gosford Public. We look forward to meeting them soon.

As this is the last newsletter before the holiday edition, I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the staff at HKHS for their hard work and dedication to making this another fabulous year. 


# **S4 Short Film Expo Night**

# In the Footsteps of Legends

Our trek leader John Nalder asked us before, along, and after the track, "What are you going to take out of this?" What were we trekkers going to take out of walking the path of our legendary Diggers when 69 years ago these men fought for the survival of our nation during WWII against the Japanese?

I'll try my best to tell you what I got out of it, though this was a personal journey, and what I gained from it will vary to the next trekker. It's truly something that can only be described by experiencing it.

"What are you going to take out of this?" The reason why I had partaken in this is so I can take as much out of the experience as possible. I wanted to learn about the experiences of the soldiers who fought, in my opinion, the most important military campaign in Australia's history, due to the fact that Australia had never been attacked as a nation before and the Diggers on this track, against the odds, managed to defend our nation from the invading Japanese, and preserve the liberty and sovereignty that we take for granted today. Also, going to Papua New Guinea, I wanted to gain an insight into what my great grandfather, Keith Reginald Clarke, experienced when serving in places in Papua New Guinea, like Milne Bay.

This was more than just a history scholarship; it was a Youth Leadership Program. While I looked to gain more skills in leading others I also learned more about myself along the track by disconnecting from the world. Being away from Facebook for a fortnight did me a world of good.

This year, thanks to the Gosford RSL, I was fortunate enough to take part in The Kokoda Youth Leadership Challenge (KYLC), which is an annual Peer Group Leadership Program sponsored by the RSL Service Clubs Association and other club organisations. The program was developed by former army major, now NSW MP Charlie Lynn, who also runs Adventure Kokoda.

On September 26 I flew to Port Moresby, excited, but anxious to an extent as about the challenge I was to face in the "land of the unexpected". Due to start the trek the next day, we soon learnt what the Papua New Guinean phrase, "hurry up and wait" meant, with our flight to Kokoda delayed for more than six hours until we called a quits to waiting, and hope for better luck the following day. We now had to complete our 155km trek 9 days, not 10.

Making up for not walking the previous day, we aimed to reach Isurava from Kokoda in just one day. After landing at the Kokoda Airstrip, day one of the trek was off to a good start, it was very humid and hiking with 20kg pack was taxing on the body. After having lunch, we got hiking again, I was just wearing my shirt and had my bag uncovered and then suddenly it started to pour. The track became muddy and slippery, I had a few falls, but the worst one was when I slipped on a rock in a river crossing, and fell in. I was saturated and absolutely miserable, but there was no stopping, so we kept walking, the rain didn't stop until we reached Isurava, at 1am! We had dinner at 2am and went to sleep at 3am. That was just the first day of my adventure.

Two hours later I had been woken up to a loud 'Cooee!' for our 5AM dawn service at the Isurava memorial. Before our service we walked down below the memorial to the place of death of an Australian hero, here we heard the story of Private Bruce Kingsbury. Without orders, Private Kingsbury ran at the Japanese under heavy fire, firing his Bren gun from the hip, he led a successful counter-attack clearing a path through the

Japanese killing up to 40 enemies until he was shot and killed instantly. For his bravery, he was awarded the Victoria Cross, the first ever in Australian territory (PNG was an Australian mandate until 1975) and the South-Pacific.

We then walked back up to the memorial where we had our dawn service. The memorial featured four pillars, each inscribed with one word that represents the values and qualities of those Australian soldiers which fought along the Kokoda track.

For our dawn service we stood on the steps of the memorial of Isurava and spoke 'The Ode' and sung the Australian National Anthem. Behind us were standing our Papua New Guinean counterparts and they started singing their national anthem. They had the voices of angels.



It was a truly overwhelming moment, everyone felt deep emotions. I, along with many of the other trekkers became teary. Despite the fatigue, I realised that this was all worth it, and I knew exactly why I was on the Track. This was my most memorable moment on the Track.

Along the track there were many other memories, one being Surgeons Rock. This was a place where injured were treated, morphine was injected and limbs were amputated. Here we heard the story of Butch Bisset dying in the arms of his brother Stan, who carried him for six hours along the arduous track.

When I speak of the Kokoda Track Campaign, I must mention the "Fuzzy Wuzzy Angels". These are the natives who helped carry supplies and our wounded along the track and earned their nickname due to their "fuzzy-wuzzy" hair. Our nation is indebted to these people and I was lucky enough to meet one, if not the only, surviving "Fuzzy-Wuzzy Angel", Ovuru Ndiki. He is 104 years old and meeting him was the biggest honour, he had this indescribable presence around him, despite being frail and in a wheelchair, there was unexplainable energy around him.



On the last day, it was only a short time of hiking until we reached the top of the hills of Ower's Corner, and after stopping for a reason unknown to us, we reached the top where we saw an elderly man waiting at the top, sitting in his walking frame, I assumed he was a veteran, and indeed he was.

During the trek, John was carrying with him dog tags of men who fought at Kokoda, one of which belonged to a man by the name of Ken Luscombe. The man waiting for us was Ken Luscombe, the owner of the dog tags that some of us had carried and which one of us had the honour of returning to him.



I was overwhelmed when we were told it was Mr Luscombe's first visit back to PNG since serving in the Kokoda Campaign in 1942. Ken Luscombe led us in crossing the proverbial finish line, through the arches at Ower's Corner, where the Papua New Guineans, who walked with us on the Trail, formed a guard of honour and sang for us, again, with their beautiful voices. This was a moment where emotion was running through my whole mind and body. All these amazing things that came together with the completion of the track was the sweetest way to complete the Track.

Walking the Kokoda Trail was the most amazing and hardest experience I have ever had but it is definitely possible for anyone who is prepared to leave their comfort-zone.

The evacuation of one of the trekkers earlier on in our journey showed the gruelling nature of the Kokoda Trail. Many times in my mind I thought about why I was putting myself through this discomfort, but each time that thought came, another half-conscious thought would remind me that 69 years ago, our forefathers had to do this without the technology we have today and most of all, the fear of death which was endemic in the jungle warfare of Kokoda.

Thinking about how we walked the track and what our Diggers went through over there really built a greater appreciation of their bravery and sacrifice.

Those four pillars at the Isurava Memorial; Courage, Mateship, Endurance and Sacrifice, resonate through the Australian identity and walking this sacred trail is something everyone who is able to do, should do in their lifetime. John Nalder asked us on the Trail, would the soldiers who sacrificed their lives for us be proud of who we are as people, have we earnt their bravery and sacrifice? It puts things into perspective for you, to look at the bigger picture, appreciate the little things and most importantly, to try and lead a significant life, not focus on leading a successful one. Those who walk the Trail become custodians of the story which is one all Australians

should know about, and as Ken Luscombe said to us, "never let it die".

#### "Lest We Forget".

I'd just like to thank all those who made this experience possible, particularly Anaconda West Gosford, for fitting me with fantastic boots and other great hiking gear and the staff at Henry Kendall High School, particularly Mr Ardley, who was instrumental in obtaining this scholarship. Also, Adventure Kokoda, for making my amazing experience on the trail what it was. And last, but certainly not least, Gosford RSL, who provided this opportunity and the support I needed in the lead up to my adventure.

It is open each Monday and Thursday from 8am - 9am.




